SIMULATION OF G 20 SUMMIT

WHAT IS G-20?
An informal group of 19 countries and the European Union, with representation of the International Monetary Fund and the World Bank.

ORIGIN
The Group of Twenty (G-20) was formed in 1999 and was originally a meeting of the Minister of Finance and the Governor of the Central Bank to broaden the discussion of policies for resolving global financial crisis.

G-20 MEMBERS
Argentina, Australia, Brazil, Canada, China, France, Germany, India, Indonesia, Italy, Japan, Republic of Korea, Mexico, Russia, Saudi Arabia, South Africa, Turkey, the United Kingdom, the United States & the European Union.

**G-20 EARTH SUMMIT
ONE EARTH ONE FAMILY**

WORKING OF G-20
Meetings of G-20 Finance Ministers and Central Bank Governors - focus on monetary and fiscal issues, financial regulations etc.
G-20 Leaders' Meetings - focuses on broader issues such as global engagement, anti-corruption, development etc.

CHALLENGES
No Enforcement Mechanism - The G-20's toolkit ranges from simple exchange of information and best practices to agreeing common measurable targets, to coordinated actions. None of this is achieved without consensus, nor is it enforceable, except for the members of peer review and public accountability.
Not legally binding - The decisions based on discussions and consensus are only advisory in nature and not legally binding.

THEME
The theme of India's G-20 Presidency - 'Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam' or 'One Earth, One Family, One Future'.
It is drawn from the ancient Sanskrit text of the Maha Upanishad.
The theme affirms the value of all life - human and animal, plant and microorganisms - and their interconnectedness on the planet Earth and on the wider Universe.
The theme also spotlights LIFE (Lifestyle for Environment), with its associated environmentally sustainable choices, both at the level of individual lifestyles as well as national development.

STRUCTURE AND FUNCTIONING
For the selection of Presidency, the 19 countries are divided into 5 groups.
India is in Group 2 which also has Russia, South Africa & Turkey.
Presidency rotates annually between each group ensuring regional balance.
TROIKA - Every year when a new country takes on the presidency, it works hand in hand with the previous presidency and this is collectively called TROIKA, ensuring continuity and consistency of the group's agenda.



Chinmaya Vidyalaya, New Delhi organised a special assembly on G20 to fabricate awareness amongst the students about this important event of the world. The Chairperson gave a brief address on the theme of India's G20 Summit – featuring the theme 'Vasudhaiv Kutumbakam' along with the reasons for the establishment of C 20 and its key initiatives and goals.

The 20 leaders of G20 nations gave a short 30 second presentation about their country and culture.

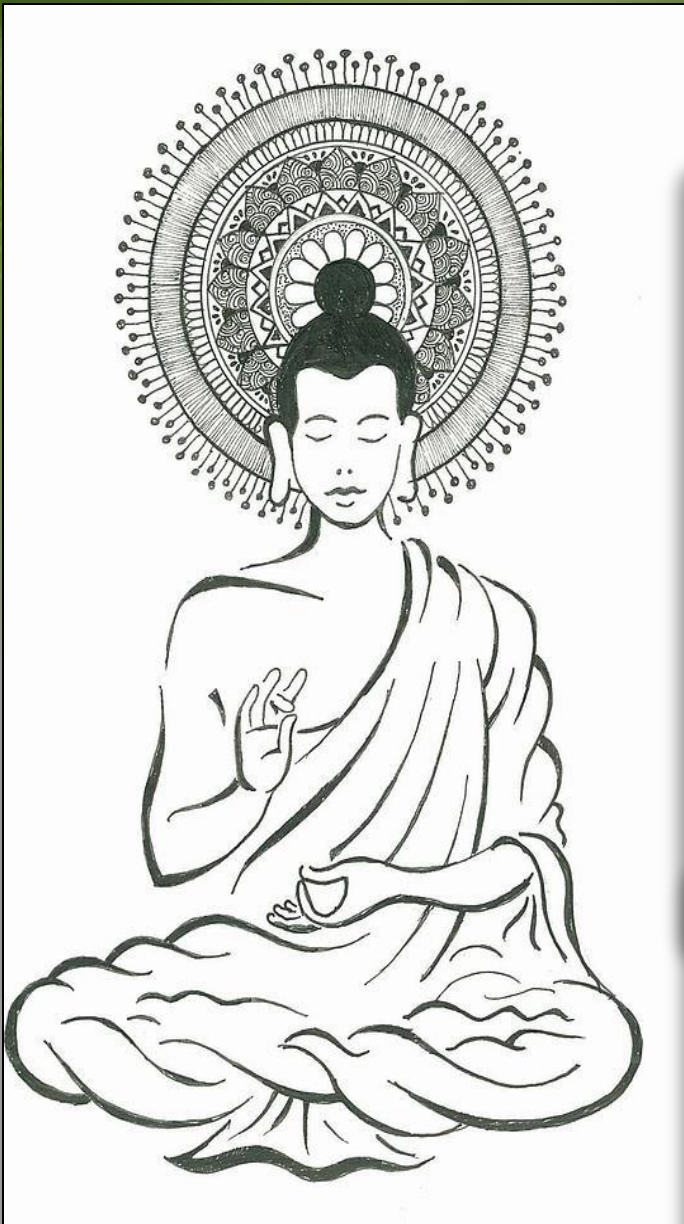
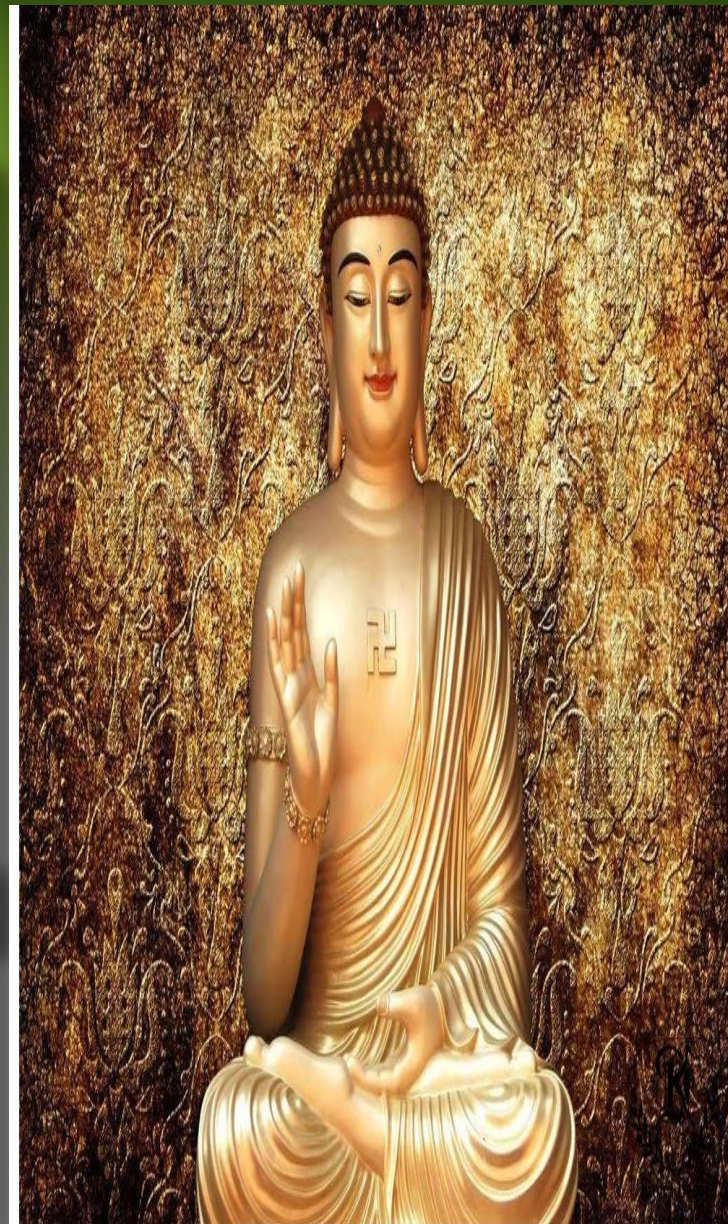
Some of them also included a saying/quote from their language about Vasudhaiv Kutumbakam (World is one family).

The day that celebrates the everlasting bond of love and affection between mother and child was held on 12th May 2023.

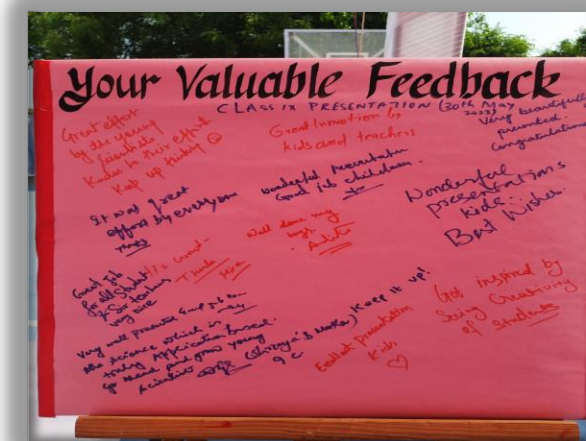

- India is a global leader in the production of spices. 70% of the world's spices come from India.

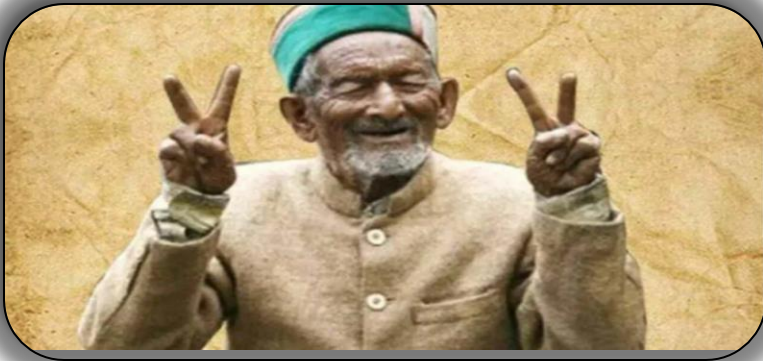


- The Indian army controls Siachen - which is the highest battlefield in the whole world.

OBJECTIVES OF G-20

The objectives of the G20 are:

- Policy coordination among its members in order to achieve global economic stability and sustainable growth;
- To promote financial regulations that reduce risks and prevent future financial crises; and
- To create a new international financial architecture.

Why does the G20 matter?

- Together, the nations of the G20 account for around 80 percent of global economic output, nearly 75 percent of global exports, and about 60 percent of the world's population.
- These figures have remained relatively stable while the corresponding rates for Group of Seven (G7) nations, a smaller group of advanced democracies, have shrunk, as larger emerging markets take up a relatively greater share of the world's economy.
- The G20 was formed in 1999, in the wake of the Asian financial crisis, to unite finance ministers and central bankers from twenty of the world's largest established and emerging economies.
- A decade later, at the height of the global economic crisis, the G20 was elevated to include heads of state and government. Many experts credit the G20 with quick action; former CFR fellow Stewart Patrick said the group "rescued a global financial system in free fall."
- In 2008 and 2009, G20 nations agreed to spending measures worth \$4 trillion to revive their economies, rejected trade barriers, and implemented far-reaching reforms of the financial system.

INDIA'S ROLE IN THE G20

- It was December 1st, 2022, when Prime Minister Modi held the gavel of the G20 presidency for one year from his Indonesian counterpart in Bali.
- The G20 is particularly important for a celebratory country like India, known in Sanskrit as “Utsavdharmita”, which loves to celebrate and showcase its cultural diversity on the global stage. During its presidency of the G20, India will have the opportunity to shape the global agenda and promote its priorities.
- Prime Minister Modi has stated that his focus will be on promoting inclusive and sustainable growth, improving digital infrastructure and access to technology, and strengthening the global trading system.

- India joined the G20 Nations in 1999 as a founding member, and its participation has grown in importance over the years. In recent years, India's economy has been growing at an average rate of 6-7%, making it one of the fastest-growing economies in the world. Its growing importance in the global economy has made India an increasingly relevant player in the G20.

One way India can contribute to global economic growth is through its domestic policies. The Indian government has implemented a series of economic reforms over the past few years to attract foreign investment, improve infrastructure, and promote entrepreneurship.

- **Materials like glass and aluminum have high recycling rates and can be recycled endlessly, but many types of plastics are labeled recyclable when they are not.**

- **Approximately 36% of all plastic produced is used to create packaging, 85% of which ends up in landfills.**



- **Globally, we produce about 400 million tons of plastic waste yearly.**



- **Plastic bottles take upwards of 450 years to degrade.**

- **The world produces about 400 million tons of plastic waste a year, but plastic is being recycled at an even lower rate than previously estimated.**

- **Paper is one of the most-often recycled materials, accounting for half of the materials collected for recycling by weight. More than 50 million tons of paper were recovered for recycling in 2021, achieving a 68% recycling rate.**

STEPS TO RECYCLE PAPER AT HOME

~Ingredients~

- Large square pan, about 3 inches deep
- 3 cups of water
- A whole section of newspaper
- A rolling pin, or a liter glass beverage bottle, or...
- a plastic pipe, tube, or any cylinder to roll with.

STEP 1

Tear 1-2 pages of newspaper into small pieces of 1 inch or less.

STEP 2

Put the paper chips into a large bowl and add all the water to it. Keep adding paper, tearing it and squeezing it, until the mixture looks like thick oatmeal.

STEP 3

With the pan turned UPSIDE DOWN, place about 1 cup of the blended pulp over the bottom of the pan. Spread it with your fingers evenly across the entire area.



STEP 4

Lay several sheets of newspaper over the pulp, then carefully turn the pan over. Remove the pan. Your pulp "square" is now sitting on the newspaper.

STEP 5

Close the newspaper over the pulp. Using the rolling pin, roll over the newspaper to blot out the extra water.



STEP 6

Uncover and let the new "paper" dry COMPLETELY. When it is thoroughly dry, peel your new "recycled paper" away from the newspaper.

It can now be cut to any size and used to make a variety of things!

The Blue and Green Dustbins are used to segregate two different kinds of wastes, the green is meant for **wet** wastes while the blue one is for dry waste. Waste segregation is done to easily separate the wastes based on their process of **recycling**.

- Glass Bottle, jars, dishes, cups, pottery, make-up jars, mirrors, light bulbs, window glass
- Aluminium rigid trays
- Household paper
- Paper gift wrap and cards
- Paper egg cartons, rolls and bags
- Boxes- Cardboard, cereal, tissue, detergent
- Newspapers, telephone directories, magazines, books

INCLUSIVE LANGUAGE POLICY AND ITS IMPACT ON EDUCATION

Imagine if one day your teacher starts teaching in Japanese. Or your textbooks are written in Dutch. Wouldn't you feel confused and left out? This is what millions of children go through daily, when they are taught in a language they don't understand or are not comfortable in. Over 70% children in developing and under developed countries fail to access education in the language that they can comprehend.

Similarly, when teachers are forced to teach in a language foreign to them it leads to the distortion and downgrading of concepts, and a drop in the level of education received by the students. Education is severely impacted and ultimately everyone has to suffer.

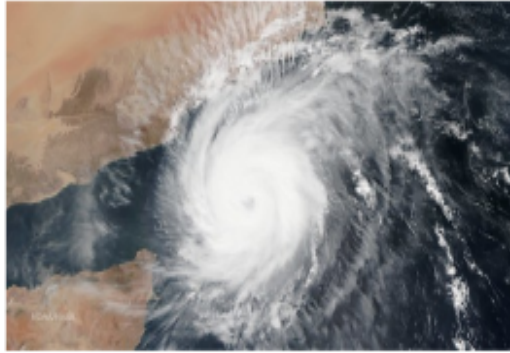
Thus, ensuring access to schooling in local languages should be stressed upon without compromise. This might seem like a challenge in India, a country with 22 official languages and 462 regional languages, but the results will be worth it.

Cyclone Biparjoy

Cyclonic Storm Biparjoy is a powerful tropical cyclone that formed over the east-central Arabian sea and made landfall near India-Pakistan border. Biparjoy originated from the depression that was first noted by the India Meteorological Department (IMD) on June 6, before intensifying into a cyclonic storm.



The Name “Biparjoy” for the cyclone was provided by Bangladesh signifying “Disaster” or “calamity in Bangla. According to IMD the cyclone was likely to move north-eastwards and cross Saurashtra and Kutch and adjoining Pakistan coasts between Mandvi (Gujarat) and Karachi (Pakistan). The Weather office issued warnings about potential blackouts and Floods in the regions. The Evacuation efforts supported by teams from army, navy, state and National relief forces. Gujarat’s coastal areas experienced heavy rainfall and strong winds which resulted in loss of three lives in Kutch and Rajkot districts. A total of 47 people were injured and 4,600 villages were affected by the cyclone.
